## STUDENTS CONTINUE LEGACY

*32 years of building affordable homes*

Residential construction students at Lincoln Northeast High School have built the 32nd home of a partnership between Lincoln Public Schools and the Lincoln Housing Authority at 3127 U St.

This year, LHA strengthened its partnership with NeighborWorks Lincoln to ensure the long-running project continued moving forward during the school year. The previous house on the property belonged to longtime draftsman Paul Sayer, who worked with NeighborWorks Lincoln and also designed the plans for the home now built on the site — a three-bed, one-and-a-half bath home.

Instructor Bob Freese has helped guide students through the construction of all 32 homes built through the program, providing students hands-on experience in framing, drywall, trim work, painting, cabinetry, exterior siding and other aspects of residential construction.

“To me, this is a wonderful project and why I’m still teaching,” Freese said. “To start with just a set of plans and go through the whole process with students — looking at plans, figuring out what we’re building, putting things together, raising it on the job site and now getting to the finishing stages where we’re doing the final woodwork and cabinets ready for the homeowner — is incredibly rewarding. Whenever I drive by one of these houses, it always warms my heart to know there’s a family living in it.”

Many program alumni have built careers in the construction trades, with several now owning their own businesses.

John Skretta, LPS superintendent, emphasized the value of this work for students.

“Learning outside of the traditional classroom gives students the opportunity to gain real-world, hands-on experience and acquire valuable skills,” he said.

“We are so proud of what these students have accomplished in terms of workplace employability skills because of the incredible instruction of Mr. Freese and their commitment to completing this project.”

Project leaders also expressed gratitude to financial supporters, especially the Sowers Club of Nebraska, which has supported the project for the past 12 years. Additional support came from the City of Lincoln Urban Development Department, the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and Sunderland Development.

The home will be sold at an affordable price through the Lincoln Housing Authority’s homeowner-ship program. The property also will become part of the Prairie Roots Community Land Trust, which helps maintain long-term affordability for future homeowners.

## FSS participant earns SCC Student of the Year

Hadia Rashidi, a Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) participant who began the program in May 2025, recently was recognized with the Outstanding Student Award at Southeast Community College.

Rashidi received the award on behalf of the biology department during an April ceremony after being nominated by instructor Tyler Corey.

Originally from Afghanistan, Rashidi came to the United States in 2021. English is her fifth language, which she said has made learning terminology especially challenging.

Despite those challenges, Rashidi has excelled academically while pursuing her goal of graduating from SCC with a degree in Health Services. She hopes to transfer to University of Nebraska–Lincoln eventually and become an OB-GYN physician.

“I want to help women with their health and during the birth process,”

she said.

Rashidi also credited Family Self-Sufficiency Coordinator Amy for providing encouragement and support throughout her educational journey. One of the most valuable things she has learned through her studies is understanding how to care for and support others.

## Dayna recognized as CLC School Community Coordinator of the Year

Lincoln Housing Authority employee Dayna was recognized for her outstanding dedication

to students, families, and the broader school community after being named the Community Learning Centers (CLC) School Community Coordinator of the Year May 1 at the CLC Stakeholders meeting. LHA serves as the lead agency for the Arnold Elementary School CLC, which Dayna coordinates year-round programming including before- and after-school clubs, summer clubs, reading incentives and more.



## Medicaid Expansion work requirements began May 1

Beginning May 1, Nebraska began requiring able-bodied adults enrolled in Medicaid expansion coverage, known as Heritage Health Adult, to work, volunteer or participate in job training activities to maintain coverage.

Adults ages 19-64 who are not pregnant, disabled or enrolled in Medicare must complete at least 80 hours in a calendar month of one or more qualifying activities, including:

- **Work:** paid employment earning at least \$580 in one month, equal to 80 hours at federal minimum wage.
- **Work program:** participating in approved work programs or training.
- **Education or apprenticeship:** attending school or an apprenticeship program at least half-time.
- **Volunteering:** performing community service.

Current Medicaid expansion members will be reviewed during their annual renewal process, beginning with renewals ending on or after July 31, 2026.

Exemptions include: parents or caretakers of children age 13 or younger; pregnant women and those up to 12 months postpartum; people caring for someone with a disability; an individual under age 26 who aged out of foster care; tribal members; veterans with total disability ratings; and those experiencing temporary hardships. Some individuals receiving

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance

Program (SNAP) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits already may meet the Medicaid work requirements.

## MyLink app connects residents to resources

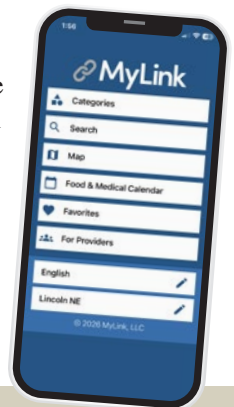
The mobile app MyLink (formerly MyLNK) helps users anonymously find community resources and services from organizations and programs in Lincoln.

The free, easy-to-use app is updated regularly to ensure accurate information. It includes resources for children and families, victims of domestic violence, disability services, senior services, military and veteran support, employment, education, food, housing, transportation, tax preparation, health care, legal

services and more.

MyLink is available for both Android and Apple devices. Once downloaded, it can be used without an internet connection or data plan to access information within the app. Resources also are available online at [mylnk.app](http://mylnk.app).

The app is offered in Arabic, Dari, English, Kurdish (Kurmanji and Sorani), Pashto, Somali, Spanish, Ukrainian and Vietnamese.



### Resident Advisory Board members

As a Lincoln Housing Authority tenant, you have the opportunity to make your voice heard by joining the Resident Advisory Board. This board plays an important role in reviewing, planning and shaping LHA programs and policies.

All participants in any LHA rental assistance program are eligible to serve. The board meets two to three times between October and November, with each meeting lasting up to two hours. To help support participation, LHA can provide assistance with transportation and child care costs if needed.

This summer, children ages 1 to 18 can receive free breakfast and lunch Monday through Friday through the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). This federally funded, state-administered program provides nutritious meals to children in low-income areas to ensure children continue to have access to healthy food when school is not in session.



All children are eligible at no cost, regardless of race, sex, national origin or disability, and no registration or income requirements are needed.

Meals must be eaten on-site during designated serving times and are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Meals are provided for children only; adults are not eligible.

# Job Corps offers free career training and education

Job Corps is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Labor that provides free education and vocational training for individuals ages 16–24. It helps participants develop skills and gain experience to enter the workforce, pursue apprenticeships, continue their education, or enlist in the military.



Job Corps operates 120 locations nationwide, with three nearby locations in Chadron, Nebraska; Denison, Iowa, and Manhattan, Kansas. These locations provide hands-on training programs in construction trades, medical certifications, office administration, facilities maintenance and more. Pine Ridge Job

Corps in Chadron is also a Civilian Conservation Center, partnering with the U.S. Forest Service.

“Through this partnership, some students have met their qualifications to work fighting wildfires while going through the Job Corps program,” said Lance Pedersen, Job Corps admissions.

In addition to career training, Job Corps can help students earn a high school diploma or equivalent and obtain a driver’s license. The program also provides career planning, on-the-job training, job placement assistance, housing, meals, basic health and dental care, a biweekly living allowance and essential uniforms and training equipment — all at no cost.

Eligibility requirements require



students be between the ages of 16 and 24, a legal U.S. resident, have no outstanding warrants or court orders and complete a background check. Income requirements do apply; however, individuals or family members receiving SNAP, TANF, SSI, CHIP or Medicaid may qualify automatically.

## New game helps users spot scams

A new free web-based game, Scout the Scam, is helping users build skills to recognize and avoid online fraud in an increasingly digital world.

Created after a family experience with an attempted scam, the game is designed to help users — especially older adults — learn how to identify fraud and stay safe online.

The interactive platform teaches internet safety through short, engaging lessons focused on real-world threats, including scam messages, misleading online content, and data privacy risks. It is designed to help users better understand how scams work and how to protect personal information online.

**The game includes three modules:**

- **Artificial Intelligence Awareness:** explores how AI-generated images, videos and content can appear highly realistic and may be used to spread misinformation or scams.
- **Scam Detection:** teaches how to identify suspicious emails and text messages, including common patterns and tactics used by scammers.
- **Cookies and Internet Safety:** explains what cookies are, how they track browsing activity, and how users can manage or decline them to improve privacy.

By combining interactive learning with practical examples, the game aims to make digital safety more accessible and easier to understand for everyone.

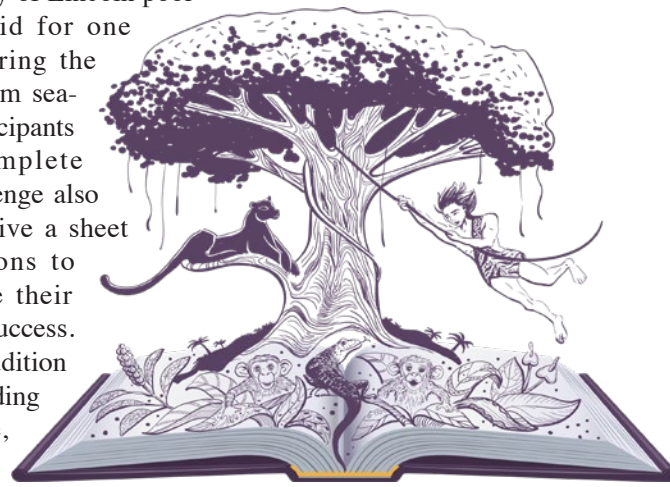
